Right next to the alley running around the south fountain, located were enclosures for wild boars (currently for alpacas) and fallow deer (currently for vicuña).

On the other side of the fountain, the alleys ran radially and curved, where, symmetrically arranged, stood residential buildings dedicated for ZOO employees: one was located in the central part of the Glae picnic area, the other near the Herpetarium

After the war, near today's Herpetarium, the so-called Leopard House was built, a place where pumas, jaguars and panthers stayed. It was home also to Zoya, a Sumatran tigress, that was rejected by her mother and grew up with a German shepherd, Frida. In 2009, Zoya was transferred to the Lisieux ZOO.

After 2010 Leopard House was shut down. Yet the wild cat sculpture, set vis-à-vis that building, still stands in the same place today.
